BEAUFORT COUNTY DEATHS FROM ALLEGED CHILD ABUSE UP IN 2009

2009 has been a terrible year for Beaufort County's children. According to SC Dept. of Health and Environmental Control (DHEC) statistics, from 1999 to 2007 there were three child homicide victims in Beaufort County. From May to November 2009, four Beaufort children died from suspected child abuse including an alleged shooting incident involving two young children.

"Children are most vulnerable from birth to age five and we (CAPA) are seeing a staggering rise locally in deaths from suspected child abuse and neglect in this age range. We are also seeing several cases of trauma involving very young children with broken bones, healed unattended breaks, infants and children living in homes where there is illegal drug activity and other very dangerous situations," said Susan Cato, executive director.

Factors that lead to child abuse and neglect include lack of parenting skills and unrealistic expectations about a child's capabilities. Ignorance of ways to manage a child's behavior and of normal child development may further contribute to child abuse as do poor education, unemployment, poverty, lack of available health care and drug abuse. Why are some families more at risk than others? Research has proven that the presence of five protective factors greatly reduce the likelihood of abuse and neglect occurring in families under stress. These five factors are:

- 1. Nurturing and attachment** - Early bonding as well as nurturing throughout childhood helps parents build a close bond with their children and better understand, respond to and communicate with their children.
- 2. Knowledge of parenting and of child and youth development** - Information about what to anticipate as children develop and strategies for effective parenting will help parents learn what to look for at each age and how to help their children reach their full potential.
- 3. Parental resilience** - How parents cope and problem solve affects their ability to deal effectively with everyday stress or a major crisis. Recognizing the signs of stress and knowing what to do about it can help parents build their capacity to cope.
- 4. Social connections** - Identifying ways to help parents expand their social networks and build a broader base of parenting support is very important. Parents with an extensive network of family, friends and neighbors have better support in times of need.
- 5. Concrete supports for parents** - Finding out what basic resources are available in the community and how to access them to address family-specific needs, such as financial and housing, will help families meet their basic needs and allow parents and caregivers to better attend to their roles.

To help parents increase protective factors, CAPA offers an eight week parenting education course based on the Triple P Curriculum, a 25-year program that has shown excellent outcomes in participants. Additionally, CAPA offers the P.S.* We Love You (*Parent Support Group). Both groups meet weekly at the outreach facility in Port Royal.

CAPA Mission:

CAPA exists to break the destructive cycle of child abuse and neglect by equipping parents, children and their caregivers with necessary skills, knowledge and values.

- \$20,000 pays for liability insurance for one year

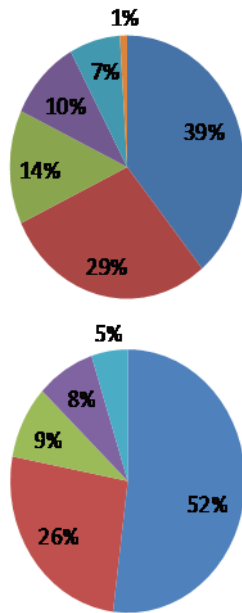

NEW PROGRAM ANNOUNCEMENT

At rape crisis centers across the country, experts are reconsidering efforts to prevent rape by engaging the male community in new ways. Historically, the violence prevention movement has focused its efforts on teaching victims how to prevent the crime. Most men will never be rapists and the vast majority of men can and do stand up against this heinous crime. However, more than 90% of reported rapes are committed by men. It is clear that men must be part of the solution if we are ever going to reduce the frequency of rape and sexual abuse in our area.

Thanks to a grant from the Wardle Foundation and United Way of the Lowcountry, CAPA has joined hands with two other local agencies that deal directly with victims of rape, domestic violence and child abuse - Citizens Opposed to Domestic Abuse (CODA) and Hope Haven of the Lowcountry - to form a collective partnership with Men Can Stop Rape (MCSR). MCSR is a national organization that seeks to address the root causes of rape and stop assaults before they occur. Through a variety of programs such as the Men of Strength (MOST) Club, MCSR mobilizes male youth to prevent violence against women by building the capacity of young men to challenge harmful aspects of traditional masculinity, value alternative visions of male strength and embrace their vital role as allies with women and girls in fostering healthy relationships and gender equity. Two local schools have agreed to serve as pilot sites and launched their own chapters of the MOST Club this year thanks to the efforts of their principals, Dr. Dan Durbin of Beaufort High School and Terry Bennett of Lady's Island Middle School.
